National Day of Mourning,: A Different Perspective on Thanksgiving

Many world traditions have a harvest time celebration. In this country, when we think of this, we think of Thanksgiving and Pilgrims and American Indians sitting down to feast together so many centuries ago. Unfortunately, this tale leaves out the truth of a sad and violent history. This is why many Native Americans choose to hold a National Day of Mourning on the Federal holiday called Thanksgiving.

In 1970, the United American Indians of New England (UAINE) organized the first National Day of Mourning in Plymouth, Massachusetts. Every year since they have held a similar demonstration. Taken from their website:

The first official "Day of Thanksgiving" was proclaimed in 1637 by Governor Winthrop. He did so to celebrate the safe return of men from the Massachusetts Bay Colony who had gone to Mystic, Connecticut to participate in the massacre of over 700 Pequot women, children, and men.

This National Day of Mourning has been written about many times, and one of the best articles came from The Huffington Post in 2015, titled "Why Thanksgiving Is A 'National Day Of Mourning' For Some Americans." In it Mahtowin Munro, a co-leader of United American Indians of New England, is quoted as saying.

There's nothing wrong with having a meal with friends and family...the real underlying issue is the mythology; there's a view that we're this big melting pot country, or there's a view that the Natives and the Pilgrims lived happily ever after.

It should be noted that the term American Indians includes many tribes with members of many faith traditions. They are not one homogenous group. However, this year as we sit down to our Interfaith Thanksgiving Prayer Service in our journey to be inclusive, it is important to remember what Thanksgiving means for so many Americans.
